

FEATURED SPEAKERS



Tom Friedman (1975) became the foreign affairs Op-Ed columnist for the New York Times in 1995. Awarded the 1983 and 1988 Pulitzer Prize for international reporting, he also won the 2002 Pulitzer Prize for commentary, and is the author of several best-selling books including Hot, Flat, and Crowded.



Andrew Robison (1962) is he recently retired Andrew M. Mellon Senior Curator at the National Gallery of Art. Over four decades he curated dozens of exhibitions on art and published widely, including a book entitled Piranesi: Early Architectural Fantasies: A Catalogue Raisonné of the Etchings.



Jonathan Galassi (1971) is Chairman and Executive at Farrar, Straus & Giroux, where he has worked with numerous National Book Award, Nobel, and Pulitzer Prize winning authors. He is the author of three volumes of poetry and several translations of Italian poetry, along with two novels.



Mark Whitaker (1979) is the author of multiple works including the critically acclaimed memoir My Long Trip Home. Previously the managing editor of CNN Worldwide, DC bureau chief for NBC News, and a reporter and editor at Newsweek, he was the first African American head of a national newsweekly.



Avery Willis Hoffman (2000) is a professor and inaugural Artistic Director of the Brown Arts Institute. She served as Program Director at Park Avenue Armory in New York, and was a senior Project Developer for the Smithsonian's National Museum of African American History and Culture.



Sarah Stillman (2012) is a staff writer at The New Yorker, where she covers criminal justice, immigration, climate change, and more; she teaches writing at Yale, and is a MacArthur Fellow.

Stillman also is the founder of the Global Migration Project at Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism.
